The Church of Mitford and Hebron Morning Prayer in the Celtic Tradition

This service of Morning Prayer draws on the traditions of ancient Celtic Christianity and reflects the rich heritage of the 7th century 'Northern Saints' such as Aidan and Cuthbert. The words and prayers we will say echo the central themes of Celtic spirituality: an emphasis on God as Trinity; the beauty and holiness of the created order; the sacramental nature of ordinary life and work; and the importance of silence and contemplation to our growth in the knowledge of God.

St Cuthbert would often retreat alone to quiet places to deepen his relationship with the Creator, in silence and meditation. We pray that in this time of worship you too will find rest for your soul. As we meet may we be refreshed and strengthened by the One who is "the same yesterday, and today, and forever" (Hebrews 13:8, KJV).
